In this interactive tasting seminar, attendees will learn about the history and production process of sake. We'll enjoy a guided tasting of three different classifications of sake from the Hakutsuru brewery, with emphasis on how the production style affects the flavors and textures of the beverage, as well as suggested pairings for each style.

A beverage professional with over ten years of experience at Chicago's world-class restaurants (Alinea, Boka, El Ideas, Yugen), Stella has also spearheaded beverage programming for Michelinstarred restaurants with a concentration in Japanese dining.
